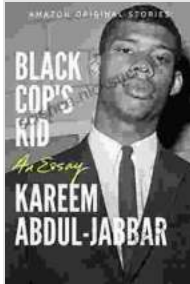

I explained that I was there to help, but my words seemed to fall on deaf ears. They saw me not as a police officer, but as a symbol of the oppression they had experienced countless times before.

That incident taught me a valuable lesson: that my Blackness would always be a factor in how I was perceived by the community I served. No matter how hard I worked or how dedicated I was to my job, there would always be those who questioned my motives and doubted my intentions.

This experience is not unique to me. Many Black police officers across the country have shared similar stories of being met with suspicion and hostility from the very people they are sworn to protect. This distrust is rooted in the history of police brutality and racial profiling against Black communities.

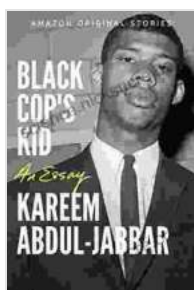
The death of George Floyd in 2020 sparked nationwide protests and renewed scrutiny of police practices. In the wake of this tragedy, many Black police officers found themselves torn between their loyalty to their profession and their solidarity with the Black community.

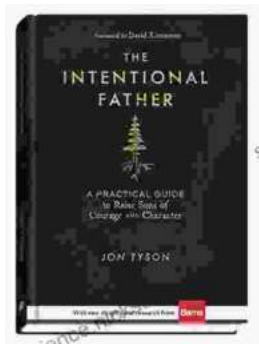
