

Florence arrived in Scutari hospital back in 1854 with a team of thirty four nurses, as requested by the Secretary of War, Sidney Herbert. When she arrived she was laced with appalling conditions in a large, open hospital that was rife with vermin and disease and unfit for purpose. Typhold and Cholera, two infectious diseases, were killing more men than the injuries! Florence was angered by this and strived to clean up for the injured soldiers that were nursed Crimean war. at the hospital.

George Holdam, of the Yorkshire Regiment, was cared for by Florence when he was injured in battle. "Florence is a wonderful woman. She looked after me with great respect and dignity. She made important changes to the hospital and made sure that the patients were well looked after."

Although the Crimean war has now ceased, Florence's role has taken on another challenge in the form of teaching other nurses back here in London.

In order to achieve this, the Nightingale Fund has been created.
